## History and background

- Funding for WIC comes from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).
- WIC was authorized by Congress in 1972 and was implemented in Pennsylvania in May 1974.
- WIC works to prevent and improve nutrition-related health problems by offering healthy supplemental foods, nutrition services, breastfeeding support and referrals to eligible women, infants, and children under age 5.
- WIC is made possible in Pennsylvania through contracts with organizations in the communities and is administered by the Department of Health.

## Where can I get WIC services?

These 89 state WIC agencies provide monthly benefits to approximately **6.4 million** women, infants, and children.

## Who is eligible for WIC?

### Women

- Pregnant
- Up to six months postpartum
- Up to one year postpartum if breastfeeding

### Infants and children

- Under 5 years old, including foster children

### All applicants must...

1. Live in Pennsylvania
2. Have a medical or nutritional need
3. Have a household gross income that does not exceed 185 percent of the US Poverty Income Guidelines. (If you receive SNAP, MA or TANF, you may apply for WIC regardless of income.)

WIC does not require proof of citizenship.

- Stores and WIC clinics

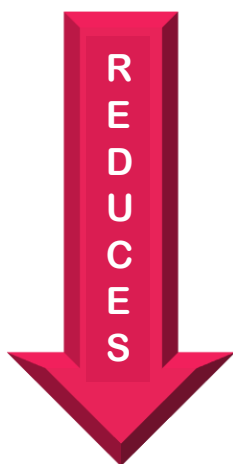
